STAR TREK: THE NEXT GENERATION BOLDLY GOING WHERE STAR TREK CLASSIC NEVER DARED

LOG ENTRY

CAPTAIN'S LOG: STARDATE 44100.9

AS PER STARFLEET ORDERS, WE HAVE RETURNED TO OUR PATROL OF THE ROMULAN NEUTRAL ZONE. Nichelle Nichols became a part of STAR TREK in May, 1966, after both pilots had been completed. She portrayed Lt. Uhura throughout the original series' three-year run and the animated episodes, and continued her role in the STAR TREK feature films.



But her association with outer space does not end there.

After becoming familiar with the work of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Nichelle became active in the space agency's astronaut recruitment program, increasing the participation of women and minorities within NASA.

In an interview, Nichelle was asked, "Do you have anything you've always wanted to say to the fans of STAR TREK, but have never had the opportunity to say?"

Oh, I think I say it every time I'm at a convention, and every time I'm with the fans. I think the most and the most STAR TREK, about beautiful thing because it is...they who fans, the important, is recognize what Gene was saying, what the philosophy and that beauty and that was, the positiveness, strength that they subscribe to and accept as fact. Non-Trekkers will see it as a fad, or an aberration of Trekker, you but if you're а humanity, understand what it is that has ennobled and enriched your life, and that it's not just because you can paint yourself green or wear some costume or enter some a reaching, accepting...really a dreamworld. It's highest good. I believe that, so I would just say, "Keep on Trekking." To me, that's what saves mankind, that ability to dream and to make it real.



SUSAN OLIVER (1937 - 1990)

Susan Oliver appeared in a wide variety of TV, movie and stage productions during her 35 years in the business, but in a way, she may be best represented by her character of Vina in Star Trek's "The Menagerie"-this one role was actually five roles, including that of the seductive green-skinned dancing girl who left an impression on an entire generation of Trekkers. This multi-faceted part accurately reflected the personality of the multi-talented Oliver, whose adventures in Hollywood were not the most colorful chapters of a life filled with exploits.

Conceived in Paris, born in New York and educated in a convent in Tokyo, the 5'5" blonde with the Mona Lisa smile and the gamin personality made her professional acting bow on the stage and soon moved into TV and motion pictures. She film-debuted in the title role of the Warner Bros. "B" movie The Green-Eyed Blonde (1957), a reform school metodrama, and went on to chalk up dozens of screen credits and scores of TV appearances (Golden Showcase's "The Picture of Dorian Gray," "People Are Alike All Over" on The Twilight Zone, Thriller, Hitchcock, Man from U.N.C.L.E., The Invaders, Night Gallery, Wild Wild West). SF movie fans found her in: Change of Mind (1969), as the wife of a man whose brain has been transplanted into a black man's (Raymond St. Jacques) body: the filmed-in-Chicago The Monitors (1970), a comedy-drama made by the Second City improv troupe: the Argentine-made House of Shadows (1977), Murder by Decree (1979) and the TV movies Death in Space and Tomorrow's Child,

But Oliver's screen accomplishments



pale a bit in comparison to a just-as-active ing," she told Frank Garcia in STARLOG private life. She was a delegate of the U.S. State Department at the Moscow Film Festival in 1963, singing folk songs outside the Kremlin and shaking up the Russians by appearing in public in cowboy boots, Western hat and riding pants, strumming a guitar. She was a Buddhist by choice and an expert on baseball. She quoted Ralph Waldo Emerson and studied the balalaika. She was a pilot who set five world records and made headlines around the globe in 1967, flying her single-engine prop plane across the North Atlantic to the Russian border. She wrote a book, Odyssev, about the flight in 1983.

"I had a taste of everything in the fly-

#135. "The racing, the jet, the ocean, but now I've caught the directing bug." And direct she did, from the film short Cowboy-San! to episodes of M*A*S*H and Trapper John, M.D. But in recent months, her acting and directing careers slowed as she began a brave bout with cancer.

In 1964, she told a columnist that she wanted to be an actress, "a full-fledged actress, with all the trimmings. At least all the trimmings I can accept." But in a later interview, acting seemed less important: "I want to be the best actress I can. But most of all, I want to be myself." Susan Oliver died of cancer on May 10.

SPOCK THOUGHTS ON SPACE AND SCIENCE

The attitude is that whatever problems we create, science will fix. They are afraid something go terribly wrong and someone will turn around and say, "Fix it," and they will have to say, "We can't. It's gone too far and it's something we can't control." That's one thing. Another aspect that, I think, we've gotten into the picture is showing that we are not the only living beings on this planet. If what touched on succeeds in what, I hope, is a fun feast to watch, an entertaining film that would be a lot.

I believe very much in the value of space exploration for scientific purposes. However, I'm also well aware that much of the motivation for funding space exploration comes from military motivation. Something you don't hear too much about is that NASA scientists are very depressed and unhappy about the idea that



space is being militarized and that there is such a thing as the Star Wars defense program. The dream is to explore space for the benefit of everybody. To unify this planet through the exploration of space. The dream is not to militarize space.

I don't know if it would be possible to relieve the tensions on Earth by working together in space. That's the dream. I sincerely believe there are people in the Russian and American hierarchy who would really like to do that. But the politics of it are not terribly supportive of that. It's a militaristic atmosphere. If we can avoid war, which I certainly hope we can, all of this military input becomes useful because it does drive science forward as it did with the aircraft in World Wars I and II. Unfortunately, in those cases, it came out of actual wars. Right now, it is coming out of fear of war. What really bothers me are the scientists who talk about how we can survive a war of that kind. It's irresponsible and stupid. Preparing people, mentally, with the idea that if we had a nuclear war, it would not be quite so devastating and that enough people would survive. That's outrageous. That's sick-It doesn't bedin to take into account the solenth

I'm also enclosing the column I wrote last fall for the Bismarck Tribune. It pretty well sums up what we have done and what we are up against.






