ASK NUMBER ONE

Commander Nada Henline has asked about how the Next Generation characters got their names. Some of the characters seem to have been named just off the top of (writers/producers) heads, while others were specifically named after particular people. Lt. Commander Geordi La Forge was named after a handicapped Star Trek fan. Tasha was originally called Macha Hernandez, patterned after a female security officer in "Alien," then her name and character were changed before filming began. Ensign Crusher was named for series creator Gene Roddenberry, whose middle name is Wesley. Our favorite android officer was quite unimaginatively named Data because of his obvious computing skills, but after four seasons, the name seems to fit him well.

Perhaps the most interesting name is that of Picard. In the 1600's, a Frenchman by the name of Jean Picard was contributing to the development of modern astronomy. He was born in La Flèche on July 21, 1620 and later became a Roman Catholic priest and professor of astronomy at the Collège de France. Picard became one of the original members of the French Academy of Sciences in 1666 and was instrumental in establishing the Paris Observatory in 1672. He improved measuring equipment such as the telescope and the pendulum clock, and was the first to use the telescope to measure angles. He is most remembered for determining the exact measurement of a degree of the earth's meridian. In a two-year project, he was able to calculate the measurement to an accuracy of within a few meters which allowed him to compute the earth's radius. His measurements and formulae were later used by Sir Isaac Newton in his work on gravity. Jean Picard died in Paris on Oct. 12, 1682.


Other famous Picards were twin brothers Auguste and Jean-Felix Piccard. These Swiss-born scientists were acclaimed for aeronautical and oceanographic exploration. Auguste invented an air-tight gondola and in 1932 ascended by hydrogen-filled balloon to a height of 53,152 feet into the stratosphere to study cosmic rays. In 1937, his brother Jean made an ascent with the help of 98 balloons--each 6 feet in diameter--to more than 57,500 feet. Auguste Piccard designed a deep-sea diving ship called a bathyscaph and in 1953 he and his son, Jacques, descended 10,300 feet into the Mediterranean Sea in their bathyscaph named "Trieste." Later, in 1960, Jacques and Lt. Don Walsh, of the U.S. Navy, descended 35,800 feet to Challenger Depths, believed to be the lowest point on earth.

Although our Captain Picard is not specifically named after any of these individuals, their traditions of exploration and scientific discovery are no doubt a legacy to the celebrated captain of the Enterprise, and no coincidence that they share an uncommon name. This Alaska Class Battlecruiser was perhaps the most ill-fated vessel to carry the name *Enterprise*. Her initial construction was delayed over three years by critics who felt that the *Enterprise* name should be synonymous with exploration. In 2293, despite continued protests, it was launched into service.

She served five uneventful years of border patrol near the Romulan Neutral Zone. Her chance finally came to make a name for herself when she was granted a ten year galaxy exploration mission. Two and a half years into her mission, the *Enterprise* sent a distress call to Starbase 67. The *Enterprise* was declared lost and presumed destroyed in 2300. What happened to the ship still remains a mystery to this day.


SHUTTLECRAFT GALILEO RESCUED AGAIN-25 YEARS LATER--BY AREA FAN

In the very first issue of ANSIBLE in April 1989, we told you about Lynne Miller, a local fan who had just purchased the shuttlecraft, Galileo, the life-sized prop used in the Trek Classic episode of the same name. Now, thanks to the kindness of strangers and some ingenuity, Part Two of her mission is accomplished. In April, the Galileo survived a cross-country "flight" from California to reach its new home in Northeastern Ohio.

Area fans will have a chance to welcome the Galileo when it is unveiled at Lagrangecon this fall.

That fall deadline became Lynne's incentive to get the shuttlecraft home and begin restoration, said Catherine Prendergast, a fellow USS Lagrange member with Lynne and her boon companion on the Galileo Quest.

First, Cathy and Lynne traveled by train to San Bernardino, California. Since Lynne bought the Galileo two years ago from a man who had rescued it from Paramount, the craft had been



housed with a storage company near Palm Springs. The women wandered among the RVs and vans on the open lot in the desert until they saw it.

"There it was, just sitting there," recalled Cathy, who recorded everything on a camcorder for a future documentary on the Galileo Quest. "It was just such an incredible feeling to see it. It was a piece of Star Trek History. I couldn't stop smiling for hours."

The actual prop used for exterior scenes for "The Galileo Seven," the craft is over 20 feet in length and weighs 2,700 pounds. The inside was full of sand, and the paint was faded, but "for being 25 years old, it was in remarkable shape," Cathy said.

Lynne had contracted with a trucking company for transportation via flatbed truck to Ohio, but first Lynne had to remove the 500-pound nacelles. Lynne managed to pry one loose herself, but had to rent a hydraulic jack to remove the second. The first truck driver declared the Galileo too fragile to move, but another driver, an older gentleman who admitted he watched Trek, got the job done. And helpful fans from a nearby 84 Lumber store used their industrial fork lift to get the nacelles on the flatbed truck. The scariest part, Cathy said, was watching the Galileo and its boat trailer, which had not been moved in five years, being rolled to sit on the flatbed.

Lynne and Cathy returned to Cleveland by train, after an experience that Cathy says she "wouldn't have traded for anything." Lynne plans to restore the Galileo and take it to various conventions.

"I think people will be willing to see that. It's a neat part of Star Trek history," Cathy said. "If you're a Star Trek fan, you can't help but -- WOW! It's very cool."

RODDENBERRY AND THE DREAM GOES ON...

Twenty-five years ago, a man Roddenberry created a named called television program In so doing, he painted a picture of the future, instilling in millions of viewers a vision, a dream to capture our No other program in imaginations. has of television history garnered as large and devoted a following as "Star Trek."


Star Trek enthusiasts (affectionately known as "trekkies") come from all walks of life, including physicists, aerospace engineers, housewives, senators, children, teachers, and professionals of many kinds.

With the advent of the Star Trek movies and the "Next Generation" television episodes, the dream goes

The show went outside television to win science fiction's coveted Hugo Award, and both the original and the Next Generation series have been honored with television's highest Not only is Star Trek the first television series to have an episode preserved in the Smithsonian, its eleven-foot starship, Enterprise, model is exhibited there on the same Wright floor as the Brothers' original airplane and Lindbergh's "Spirit of St. Louis." The model acts as the Smithsonian's tribute to the role that art and imagination plays in pointing out new frontiers.

Gene Roddenberry started something twenty-five years ago that is reaching legendary proportions and is still growing.

Gene has become somewhat



legend, himself. He is one of those rare producers whose name has star quality. As creator and producer of the original "Star Trek" series, he launched a phenomenon without precedent in show business and attained a celebrity status unique among his peers. As the legend grows, he is in constant demand for personal appearances, attracting sell-out crowds wherever he goes.

While making Star Trek, Roddenberry's reputation as a futurist began to grow. Since then, his papers and lectures have earned him high professional regard in that field. He has spoken on that subject at NASA meetings, at the Smithsonian Institute, to Library of Congress gatherings, and at top universities. While he still enjoys entertaining audiences with behind-thescenes stories of the television industry and Star Trek, he is now in increasing demand as a keynote speaker at business and professional conventions.

Gene has led a life as colorful and exciting as almost any high adventure fiction. He was born in El Paso, Texas, on August 19, 1921, spent his boyhood in Los Angeles, studied three years of college pre-law and then transferred his academic interest to aeronautical engineering and qualified for a pilot's license. He volunteered for the U.S. Army Air Corps in 1941 and was ordered into training as a flying cadet as World War II began. Emerging from Kelly Field, Texas, as a second lieutenant, he was sent to the South Pacific where he entered combat at Guadalcanal, flying B-17 bombers against enemy strongholds. In all, he took part in 89 missions and sorties and was decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal.

While in the South Pacific, he began to write. He sold stories to flying magazines and poetry to other publications, including The New York Times. Returning from combat, he became a trouble-shooter for the Air Staff, investigating the causes of air crashes. At the end of the war, he joined Pan American World Airways and flew runs to Casablanca, Lisbon, London, Johannesburg, and Calcutta. When not flying, he studied literature at Columbia University in New York.

It was on a flight from Calcutta that his plane lost two engines and caught fire in flight, crashing at night in the Syrian Desert. As senior surviving officer, Roddenberry sent two Englishmen swimming across the Euphrates River for help. Meanwhile, he parlayed with nomads who had come to loot the dead. The Englishmen reached a Syrian military outpost which sent a small plane to investigate. Roddenberry returned with the small plane to the outpost, where he broadcast a message that was relayed to Pan Am, which sent a rescue plane. He later received a Civil Aeronautics commendation for his efforts during and after the crash.

He then left his flying career behind and went to Hollywood to try his hand at writing for television. He found few openings for an inexperienced writer, so he decided to join the Los Angeles Police Department in order to see life from perspectives valuable to a writer.

By the time he had become sergeant, he was selling scripts to such shows as "Goodyear Theatre," "The Kaiser Aluminum Hour," "Four-Star Theatre," "Dragnet," "The Jane Wyman Show," and "Naked City." Established as a writer, he turned in his badge and became a free-lancer. Later, he served as headwriter for the highly popular series "Have Gun, Will Travel." His episode "Helen of Abiginian" won the Writer's Guild Award and was distributed to other writers as a script model for the series. Next, he created and produced "The Lieutenant" TV series starring Gary Lockwood and Robert Vaughn. Then came Star Trek, from 1966-1969, and history was made.

After the Star Trek series ended, Roddenberry produced the motion

picture "Pretty Maids All in a Row," starring Rock Hudson, Angie Dickinson and Telly Savalas. He has also done a number of TV pilots. Among these are "Genesis II" in 1973, "The Quester Tapes in 1974, then a sequel to "Genesis II"--"Planet Earth." He also co-wrote and produced "Spectre," a two-hour //"--"Planet Earth." horror movie for NBC in 1977.

He then wrote and produced "Star Trek: The Motion Picture," as well as the novelization; and, he has been the creative consultant on all the other Star Trek feature films.

in 1987, Star Trek fandom's dreams came true, as Star Trek: The Next Generation debuted. It has now surpassed the original series in number of episodes produced and continues to be the top rated syndicated series on television.

Gene has received many awards and honors over the years. Included are the American Freedom Award, the Humanist Arts Award, three honorary doctorate degrees from leading universities, and on September 4, 1986, his fans presented him with a "Star" on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. He was the first writer/producer to be so honored.

He is married to Majel Barret (Nurse Chapel from the original series and Lwaxana Troi from the Next Generation), and they have a sixteen-year-old son, Gene Roddenberry, Jr. He also has two grown daughters, Darleen and Dawn,

from a previous marriage, as well as two grandchildren.

I have had the privilege of meeting Gene Roddenberry three times. fan club has presented him with one of our Kelly t-shirts and a Next Generation Plaque. We wish the best for Gene and hope he's around for another twenty-five years. In the meantime, for fans all around the world, because of Gene Roddenberry, the dream goes on...

Although the ship is self-cleaning, it's unable to reduce clutter; and


donations were generous.

THE ONE AND LONELY

by Richard Krzemien The Enterprise is on routine patrol, when the ship's sensors lock onto an object, a 21st Century cosmonaut. The crew is admittedly stunned. They beam the body aboard, in order to provide a "proper burial," but are shocked to find that he is somehow alive.

It turns out that this cosmonaut was a member of a Mars mission taking place in the year 2015, which was one of the first cooperative efforts of the entire planet, and a direct predecessor to Starfleet Command, and, then, The United Federation of Planets. Back then, an alien vessel had approached them and made the seemingly incredible offer of sharing its advanced technology; an offer that split the crew up into different factions. This cosmonaut, as he explains, was very much against the acquisition of such advanced powers, for fear it would result in the return of the arms race, which had finally been abolished some time earlier. His opposition became a major threat to the aliens, so he was used as an example of their technology and launched into the future.

Data quickly digests the information, and comes up with the supposition that these aliens, who have obviously mastered time travel, could conceivably have come from the future, and the purpose of their journey to the past was to destroy the single mission that had more to do with the creation of Starfleet than all others. The result of this would be that the aliens would hope to be able to use force on the galaxy, with no one strong enough to combat them.

Enterprise technology manages to locate the time portal from which the cosmonaut emerged, and go through it to the past. They arrive near the space station, and their first action is to fight off an attack from this alien craft described by the cosmonaut. Although it takes a considerable amount of effort, Captain Picard is able to beam over to the space station to address the people from Earth, stating that he hopes "they will understand the future rewards if they can only agree amongst themselves and reject the aliens."

The aliens, in the meantime, have learned that by disrupting this Mars mission, all future history will be altered. But now the sudden appearance of the Enterprise, and the cosmonaut, have jeopardized their goal. The latter, they also learn, is the focal point in time that must be removed. The aliens reason that their mission will be fruitful if they propel the Enterprise back to the future and kill the cosmonaut, this way he will not be able to warn the starship of what they are planning.

Their efforts, through a great act of faith, fail, and the Enterprise personnel manage to whisk both them and the alien vessel to the future, where the Federation starship is able to obtain control of the prototype time machine that caused all the problems in the first place, and destroy it.

DID YOU KNOW?

On Sep. 7, 1991, at Knowledge Night, the U.S.S. Kelly gave away a total of 320 knowledge points. Kyle Stauffer earned the highest individual amount with 17 points.

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


