and enjoying it.



A DAY WITH JEFF RECTOR AND LOLITA FATJO

For those of you who didn't get a chance to see Jeff Rector and Lolita Fatjo at the Cinemaholics seminar I thought I would let you in on a few secrets we got to hear first hand on October 15th.

Jeff Rector was very interesting. I wasn't particularly enthused to get to meet him at first but he turned out to be a really good guest. For those of you who don't know which actor I am speaking of, he played Alien #2 in the Star Trek:Next Generation episode, Allegiance. His twin brother Jerry Rector played Alien #1. Jeff gave us some real insight about being an actor in Hollywood. He is one of the 3% of actors that actually pays his bills by acting. He is currently working on a movie with Bridgette Neilson called "Terminal Force". It's a sci-fi action movie that looked really good from the clips Jeff brought.

Lolita Fatjo is the script coordinator for Star Trek: Voyager and Deep Space Nine and she was also the coordinator for "Generations". She is the person everyone sends their script to.

She was born in Santa Clara, California. Her father was a scout for the New York Yankees baseball team. She graduated from Santa Clara University with a degree in acting. She decided she couldn't make a living as an actress and started working behind the scenes. During the writer's strike in Hollywood during the second season of ST:TNG, she was working in a copy shop. When the writer's strike was over she got a call from her agent and he advised her he had a few openings for her. She took the job with Star Trek because she knew their software. She has NEVER seen an episode of the old series. For that matter neither has Brannon Braga. She grew up watching Lost In Space. But she loves Next Generation and DS9 very much and is looking forward to Voyager.

Lolita got to work directly with Gene Roddenberry for 2 years. She was also assistant to producer Burt Armus, who the alien Armus was named after, and she took over Eric Stillwell's job as script coordinator when he left the show to run Horizon's Conventions. Fajo Kivas was named after Lolita.

She brought slides from upcoming episodes for Deep Space Nine, she didn't go into specifics but here are some of the tidbits she let us know about:

-SECOND SKIN-We see a totally different side of Kira.

-CIVIL DEFENSE-Jake and Marta, the Dabbo girl, get together, all too together for Sisko.

-MERIDIAN-Sisko, Jake, and O'Brien are working underground and get trapped by a fire.

-DEFIANCE-Thomas Riker comes to DS9-won't be back-goes to the place all bad people go...

-FASCINATION-Lwaxanna visits DS9.

-PAST TENSE I&II-A transporter malfunction puts Dax, Basher and Sisko in 2021San Francisco amid gang members and gang graffiti.

-'THE UNTITLED CROSSOVER SEQUEL'-Is just that...

Lolita also gave us some great information about submitting scripts to Star Trek. There is a 24 hour hotline for you to call and get a Paramount release form and specifics on how they want the script to look. If you don't follow these specifications your script will NOT be read. In the package you get from the studio, there will be a one page sample script page. You should make this your ONLY guideline. Some of the do's and don'ts she shared with us were, never do a two part script, send the script in a manila envelope, not a box. The script should be anywhere from 55 to 60 pages.

If your script is good and I mean PERFECT, they might buy it...but only 3 scripts have ever been purchased. You might get a call from Lolita and she might ask to buy your story, in that case you will get screen credit for the story and someone else will write the teleplay. Or she might call and ask to buy your premise-you get no residuals but you get in the door and it counts as points towards your screen writers guild card(very important if you want to do this for a living). Last but not least she could call and ask you to come to California and pitch story ideas to the head writers. This is a wonderful opportunity to get your foot in the door also. So, if you have any desire to write a Star Trek script call 213-956-8301, and get your release form. The rest is up to you.

Cinemaholics is going to bring Lolita back with the Writer's Workshop. Along with her will be Brannon Braga and Ron Moore. I suggest that if you ever want to write a script...GO!!!

LeVar Burton knows time travel. After seven seasons exploring the final frontier as Lt. Geordi La Forge on "Star Trek: The Next Generation," Burton has turned back the clock a few centuries for his latest role. He plays a minister's son and doctor's apprentice in the fact-based CBS series "Christy," about a young teacher who comes to the mountains of Tennessee in 1912. Filming now at the Museum of Appalachia in Norris, Tenn., Burton recalled his own past, first winning acclaim as the young slave Kunte Kinte in the miniseries "Roots."

The late "Roots" author Alex Haley once lived nearby. "A day does not go by that someone doesn't talk about Alex, usually relating a personal experience with him," Burton said.

It's a question on many a Trekker's mind since The Next Generation started. Who's the better captain, Kirk or Picard? This question could even give Data trouble. Of course the plot is standard for Star Trek, villainous alien (McDowell) threatens to destroy the universe, and Picard, Kirk, and crews must stop him. (Will they?) There are a couple of twists thrown in for good measure, Picard has somesort of personal tragedy and Data gets that emotional chip, (finally!) It's all pure Trek, but as Sirtis says, "If it's not broke, why fix it?"

Of course a lot of us are asking that question about the series. Sirtis states that "Why couldn't we have carried on?" "Just because its successful on TV doesn't mean a movie's going to be." Oh well, I guess we'll just have to see how the movie is.

Rick Berman (the new producer, in case any of you have been in a time warp & don't know about him) admits that the real purpose of having the original crew aboard is to wrap up the 23rd-century saga, something the film does with a, um, minor plot development. And McDowell gets to do away with Captain Kirk. But he was quite impressed with the way Shatner took the death of a character he has played for nearly 30 years: "He was fairly jolly about the whole thing." and Sirtis says, "I thought it was a really brave thing to do, but it's easy to be brave when it's scifi." "Kirk's death writes the final chapter of that era." Berman says, then adds, "but in Star Trek, people do have a habit of coming back." What the heck does that mean????? Are they planning to bring Kirk back??


Well if they do, will he be the same guy (Shatner), younger, older, or what?

(R.I.P. LURGA AND B'ETOR)





SHIPS OF THE GALAXY

U.S.S. ENTERPRISE, NCC-1701-B

Historical Reference

CLASS: Excelsior Class Battleship

GENERAL NOTES: After the decommissioning of the *USS Enterprise* NCC-1701-A, Starfleet Command decided to continue the tradition of the name by baptizing an *Excelsior* Class Battleship as a new *USS Enterprise*. Instead of assigning it a different hull number and adding a "II" to its name, Starfleet decided to retain the Naval Construction Contract Number 1701, and place a letter after it. It was built at Starfleet's Antares Ship Yards over Antare III. Although the decision to model this ship on the failed original experimental *Excelsior* was at the time controversial, the economics of using the existing (and otherwise successful) engineering of the basic spaceframe were compelling. The wisdom of this decision has been borne out by the large number of *Excelsior* Class battleships that still serve Starfleet in a variety of capacities. (Indeed, the *Excelsior* herself ultimately proved to be a distinguished part of the Starfleet.)

Some were opposed, arguing that the *Enterprise* was a heavy cruiser and not a battleship. If Starfleet wanted to retain the *Enterprise* name, it should go to one of the new *Constellation* Class cruisers, with their distinctive quadruple nacelle design.

In the end, the Excelsior class kept the Enterprise name because this class was intended to be the new workhorse of Starfleet, much like the Constitutions and Enterprises of a few decades earlier. Starfleet officials believed that the Enterprise name should be given to a ship class that would have high visibility.

Ironically, the *Constellation* cruiser became a famous class in its own right, for one of its number served as Captain Jean-Luc Picard's ship in the engagement with the Ferengi that led to his famous "Picard Maneuver."

The battleship USS Enterprise, NCC-1701-B had its own distinguished career. On her maiden voyage she rescued 47 El-Aurian refugees from the transport ship Lakul, which was damaged by the Nexus energy storm. A rescue attempt that claimed the life of Starfleet legend Captain James T. Kirk. Loosely assigned to Star Base 12, the ship took part in many engagements in the Neutral Zone and the Triangle. It also served on 4 five-year galaxy exploration tours, and was a key figure in the exploration of space beyond the Gourami Sector. This ship and her crew were responsible for mapping over 142 star systems, including first contact with seventeen civilizations. The career of the Enterprise also boasted the least crew losses by death for six years strait. A far cry from her predecessor!

The *Enterprise* often served as a transport for dignitaries. Its passengers included, at one time or another, the Klingon Chancellor and his consort, the Romulan Praetor, six of the most powerful Orion families, the whole Vulcan political hierarchy, 50 Star Fleet Admirals, and the entire Federation Council. Fortunately, they were not all aboard simultaneously!


The *Enterprise*'s career ended in a fashion befitting its name and class. On 2335, the *USS Enterprise* engaged an Imperial Klingon States (Klingon Renegades) L-24 battleship and a Romulan *Nova* Class battleship, which were working together in the Triangle, five parsecs from the Imperial Klingon States. Though the Romulan and Klingon vessels were defeated, it was a pyrrhic victory, for the *USS Enterprise* also fell. Fearful of losing any more of its already scarce ships-of-the-line, the IKS pulled back its fleet and cut back on its Neutral Zone raids almost to nothing.







Notes on Malcolm McDowell

"Now, if you'll excuse me Captain, I have an appointment with eternity and I don't want to be late." Dr. Soran to Captain Picard -- "Star Trek: Generations"

"You know," says Malcolm McDowell nonchalantly, "I get to do away with Captain Kirk." Those words quoted in Daily Variety has propelled Malcolm McDowell into Star Trek fandom. An English actor who has never seen either TV series. McDowell was impressed with the way Shatner took the death of a character he has played for nearly 30 years. McDowell plays Dr. Tolian Soran an El-Aurian scientist who's obsession to return to a galactic nirvana, known as the Nexus, drives him to cross paths with Captains Kirk and Picard.

The actor's long career includes major roles in Stanly Kubrick's classic dystopic vision A Clockwork Orange; John Badham's Blue Thunder, the repellent, Bob Guccione-produced Caligula; and Star Trek II & VI director Nicholas Meyer's Time after Time, in which he portrays H.G. Wells pursuing Jack the Ripper, played by David Warner, from the 19th century into the

present.

Upcoming projects for McDowell include Tank Girl, which is directed by Rachel Talalay and produced by Richard Lewis. The movie, based off of the Dark Horse Comic, is currently filming in White Sands, New Mexico. Set for a spring 1995 release. After which McDowell has been tapped to play Riyuken, a stoic philosopher living in a post-apocalyptic world in Fist of the North Star. A live-action movie, based off the Japanimation movie, to be directed by Tony Randel. And finally McDowell will star in the Wing Commander III CD Rom Game with Mark Hamill.

Generations Director David Carson considers McDowell the key to the movie. He believes that if the villain isn't satisfactorily frightening and powerful in a Star Trek vehicle, the story quickly flattens out. "I think McDowell's wonderful - we were very lucky to get him." he says "Like all the Star Trek villains, he has to go up against everybody, so he carries half the movie. He sits at the same level of Picard and Kirk, and he does very well. Malcolm McDowell is especially equipped to be a Star Trek villain because he is such an incredibly talented performer, an instinctive actor who can also handle words, which people in Star Trek need to do."



Data's Cat

pace—the final frontier. These are the voyages of the Starship Enterprise. Its continuing mission: to explore strange new worlds, to seek out new life and new civilizations, to boldly go where no one has gone before."

And where no cat has gone before.

When the original Star Trek series aired on television in the


late 1960s, life aboard a spaceship was envisioned as somewhat sterile. There were no families, no children and only an occasional Shakespearean play or musical performance for entertainment. Except for 'some unfortunate small, alien fur balls called tribbles that were ultimately beamed aboard an enemy Klingon vessel, there were no animals aboard the Enterprise.

But the creators of Star Trek: The Next Generation, now in its seventh television season, have seen fit to outfit the new 24th century spaceship with all the comforts of home, including pets.

One pet in the series is an orange tabby named Spot who is the feline companion to one of the ship's commanding offi-

cers, the android Data. When one considers the emotional benefits of having pets, keeping a cat may seem like an unusual calling for a character who has no emotions. But for Data, having a cat as a companion not only helps him better understand the kinds of emotional bonds that his human counterparts experience, but it also brings him a step closer to being like them. For Data, becoming human is an occupation in itself.

His goal is only slightly undermined by his choice of a name for his cat. "Spot" is ordinarily a name given to dogs, particularly spotted dogs, but Data retrieved the name from a list of common pet names in his extensive internal databank of information and gave it to his tabby cat. While Data may not have any emotions, he apparently has a lot of heart.



If any CAT FANCY readers have ever found themselves wondering what life will be like in the future for humans and their pets, the Star Trek writers have created a hopeful scenario. During the various episodes in which Spot appears, we learn that futuristic cats still require a "sand box" for disposal of kitty wastes. But there is no dumping of cat litter in this vision. Aboard the Enterprise, all waste, feline or otherwise, is recycled as part of the ship's environmental support systems. Contaminants are removed. and the resulting water is biologically sterilized by heating to extreme temperatures. Once this occurs, it is stored for

Spot's meals are generated through the Enter-

prise's food replication system that instantaneously recreates any kind of food that cats, or humans, desire. Data often experiments with different combinations of nutritionally complete foods for Spot. In one of the episodes, we learn that Spot's favorite food is "Feline Supplement No. 25."

For any of us cat owners who live in multicat households, having not only this kind of waste management system for cat litter disposal but also a food replicator to satisfy even the most finicky cats would be a dream come true.

By watching the series we also learn that cats of the future are much like their 20th-century counterparts. In the episode

"Phantasms," Data temporarily gives Spot to Worf, the Klingon security commander, for safe keeping. Worf orders Spot to. "Come here!" as one might talk to a dog.

"Unlike a canine," Data instructs Worf about his temporary charge, "Spot does not respond to verbal commands. You must talk to him, tell him he's a pretty cat and a good cat."

Disgruntled, Worf carries Spot at arm's length out of Data's quarters. On the way out the door, we observe Worf sneezing. Apparently Klingons in the 24th century also can be allergic to cats.

Spot is actually played by two cats who look very much alike: Brandy and Monster. Both are part of the performing crew Critters of the Cinema, owned by animal trainer Rob Bloch. A longhaired cat played Spot the first time he appeared in the ser-

ies, but the producers wanted an orange tabby.

Brandy and Monster have performed in about half a dozen episodes of *Star Trek: The Next Generation*, plus television commercials and other shows, such as *Murder She Wrote*. Both cats are easy to work with, and as yet, none of the cast and crew have been found to be allergic to them.

Brandy is a more laid-back cat, according to Bloch, and performs in scenes that require no action. "Most of the time, he does nothing," said Bloch.

Monster, on the other hand, is a more emotionally charged cat who performs what Bloch calls the "A to B stuff"—running from one point to another.

Bloch uses food to motivate the two feline stars. Treats of

tuna, salmon, sardines and baby food are offered as rewards for a good performance. Filming sessions are eight to 12 hours, but the two cats are not working the entire time. To assist them with their part of the script, two trainers are on-site at all times. When they are not on the set, the two feline stars stay in a specially equipped trailer.

Both Brandy and Monster were animal shelter rescues. Monster earned his name by biting Karen Thomas, one of his trainers. Thomas spends a lot of time with the two cats, playing with them and bonding with them to win their trust. Critters of the Cinema employs more than 40 cats. six of which are orange tabbies, as well as dogs, iguanas and parrots.

While it is unknown whether Brent Spiner, who plays Data in the series, has any cats, one of the other cast members does.

Marina Sirtis, who plays the ship's counselor, Deanna Troi, has at least one cat. His name? Data.
