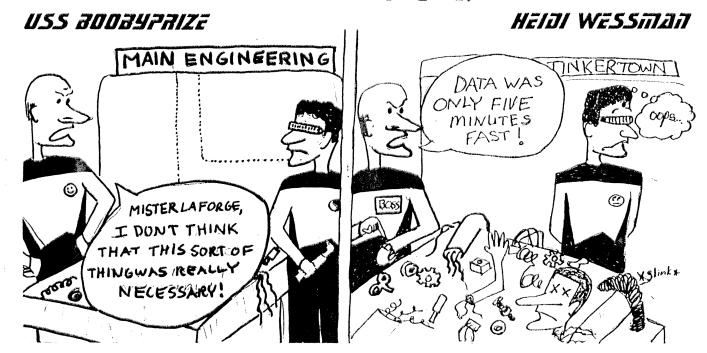
For those who have already done some of the original training sheets, don't worry, they still count. In fact, we're still going to use them under different titles. There is even a chart for converting the old system into the new one.

Deep Space Nine Ends Voyage Star Trek: Deep Space Nine (Monday, August 24, 1998 11:58 AM) has reached the final frontier: season seven. Paramount has announced that the crew of the syndicated series is heading into its last season on board the broken down space station.

"Like Star Trek: The Next Generation, we had always intended to tell the story of Star Trek: Deep Space Nine in the span of seven years," says creator-exec producer Rick Berman. "As we embark on the seventh and final season, we look forward to the challenge of concluding this important chapter in Star Trek history."

The show, which debuted in January of 1993, is still one of the top-ranked syndicated drama series. With its demise, only the lost souls aboard Star Trek: Voyager will carry on the Trek legacy.

The season premiere will find Commander Sisko facing his future, and will also introduce the first new character in the series' history. Actress Nicole de Boer joins Star Fleet as Ensign Ezri Dax, the new host of the 300-year-old symbiont who previously

resided in the body of Jadzia Dax, played for six seasons by Terry Farrell.

Deep Space Nine" Deep-Sixed

Set your phasers on stunned.

Star Trek: Deep Space Nine, the second spin-off series to carry on the sci-fi tradition founded by Kirk, Spock, et al., will end its run next spring, producers have announced.

"Like Star Trek: The Next Generation, we had always intended to tell the story of Star Trek: Deep Space Nine in the span of seven years," creator and executive producer Rick Berman said in a statement.

The Emmy-winning Deep Space Nine, starring Avery Brooks as Captain Benjamin Sisko, premiered in January 1993, making the upcoming 1998-99 TV year its seventh--and last.

The new season launches the week of September 28. Through its run, Deep Space Nine was a consistent, if not spectacular, top-ranked drama in the first-run syndication market.

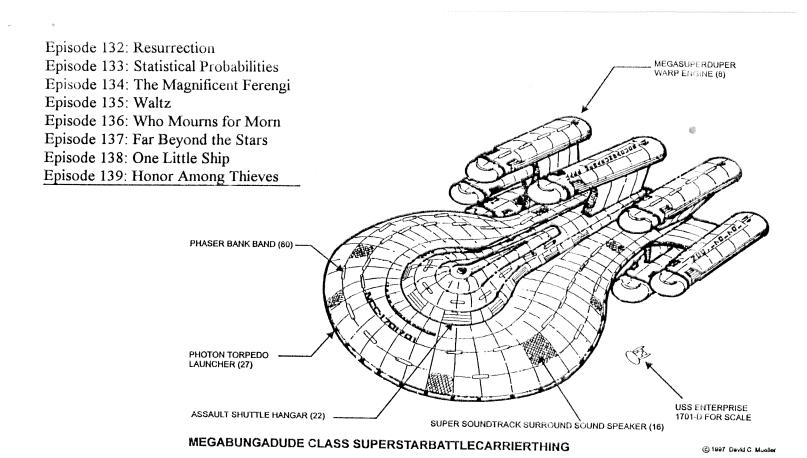
The workhorse middle child of the latter-day Trek franchise, it was never as widely acclaimed as its older sibling (Next Generation), nor as widely hyped as its younger one (UPN's Voyager).

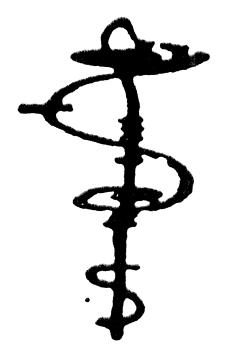
But after a rough first season (during which it tried to distinguish itself as the cranky Trek), the show settled into comfortable run--winning awards (including two prestigious Hugo **Awards** for outstanding writing on a sci-fi series) and viewers. The impending loss of Deep Space Nine cannot be good news to those loval viewers. In contrast to 1994 when the powers-that-be eased the pain of Next Generation's forced retirement by introducing Voyager months later, there is no immediate promise of a new Trek series. (And for Deep Space Nine regulars, there's also no note of that ultimate golden parachute: their own movie franchise.) This leaves the aforementioned Voyager as the soon-to-be-only new Trek show on TV.

If there's some good Trek news to be passed on here, it's this: The family's ninth big-screen outing, Star Trek: Insurrection, is due to released in just 79 days--on November 11.

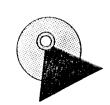

TRANSPORTER TECHNOLOGY FOR THE NON-ENGINEER By Lt. George Bogler

Transporters work by dissolving the sub-atomic bonds of the transport subject, converting the subject into an energy stream, then re-establishing the bonds in a new location according to a stored pattern of the subject. Living matter is transported at the "quantum" level, while everything else is transported at the "molecular" level. Quantum transport requires more energy and pattern storage. You may recall from the episode "Our Man Bashir," that when the transport of the runabout crew malfunctioned & most of DS9's systems went down that the physical patterns were stored in holosuite memory, but it required the total storage capacity of the station to hold their quantum patterns.

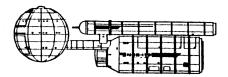
Transport or "beaming" is accomplished as follows. Transporter "targeting scanners" calculate relative range and speed between target and destination, as well as verifying a suitable environment at the location. Transporter self-diagnostic routines are also performed at this stage. Next, the "molecular imaging scanners" create and store a resolution pattern of the subject (transporter trace). Each pad uses 4 scanners—3 of which must agree to permit beaming.

Actual beaming begins as the "annular confinement beam (ACB) forms a protective field around the subject. Within the ACB the "phase inducers" or "phase transition coils" accomplish the physical materialization/de-materialization of the subject. The matter stream is then routed to the "Pattern Buffer" for temporary storage. The buffer assembly includes special processors to adjust the pattern according to data previously gathered by the targeting scanners. The pattern is then sent to "emitters" on the hull, which transmit it to the destination. The emitter assemblies also contain long-range inducers & coils for beaming from a remote location such as a planetary surface. When beaming up, the pattern buffer is used to hold the subject for up to 7 minutes to permit biofilter & weapons scans or to allow for security or other personnel to meet the subject (subjects have no sense of time passage while in transport). The buffer also allows for site-to-site (internal) transport and as a safety in case of problems with the transport process.

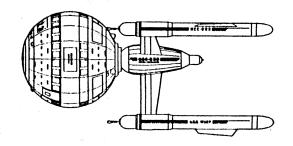
Galaxy Class Starships have six personnel and four cargo transporters (cargo transporters can be adjusted from molecular to quantum resolution) with a range of 40,000 km. They also have six emergency evacuation transporters (beam out only) with a range of 15,000 km. Under emergency conditions a Galaxy Class Starship can evacuate 1850 persons per hour and beam up 1000 per hour.

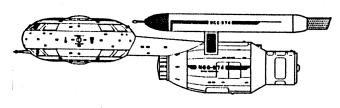
The Kelly Class Starship contains 2 additional cargo transporters and 3 additional emergency transporters. These emergency transporters are designed for troop deployment as well as evacuation and can process 300 transports every 4 minutes.

DAEDALUS CLASS - 2158

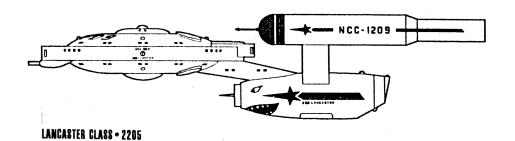


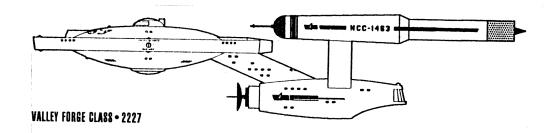
