




#### Yhat at Stake in the Last 'Star Trek: Voyager'? Only the Fate of the Universe

For seven seasons, he has wonfor seven seasons, he has wan-dered the universe without a full identity. But when UPN's "Star Trek: Voyager" makes its final landing to-night, fans will at last be on a first-name basis with the character known as "Doc."

It's just a first name, though.
"Tget half a name. I said if a name is

jokes Robert Picardo, whose portrayal
of a holographic medico aboard a
struckia luckia sono (TDN)" (a na) starship lost in space (KPNZ, 9 p.m.) has required him to maintain the illu-

has required him to maintain the illusion that he's ageless.
At 47, the actor knows better.
"When you compare my face to the pilot, you'll see that gravity has worked its magic on me, too," Picardo said in a phone interview last week. Still, "one of the great things about going bald in your 20s is that you look the same age for 30 years. It's the only great thing about going bald in your 20s."

Picardo's doctor is one of a number

of characters in the "Star Trek" fran chise, beginning with Leonard Ni-moy's half-Vulcan Mr. Spock, who

have struggled with the question of what it really means to be human. Like Data (Brent Spiner), the an-droid of "Star Trek: The Next Genera-tion," Doc has evolved over the course

of seven years as a non-human being.
"I was pretty cranky the first cou-ple of seasons." Picardo said.
Things improved for the character and the actor - in Season 3, when the writers devised an excuse to spring the hologram from his sick-bay

environment through the use of a "holo-emitter," a gizmo acquired in an

noio-emitter, a gazmo acquiren in an episode involving time travel.

"Bosically, I was using 29th-century technology in the 34th century, a clear violation of the temporal prime directive," said Picardo. (For the uninitiated, that's Trek-speak for "It's not nice to fool Mother Nature.") Star Trek fans are known for their

strictness in such matters, but there was no outbry "because I was apparently popular enough" to overcome the violation, he said.

Freed from the starship's medical facility, "I got to be in stories that were not strictly medical stories and this

not strictly medical stories and this was again flattering." said Picardo, who before "Voyager" had been best known for playing Coach Cuttlip in "The Wonder Years."

"Then in Season 4, Seven of Nine came aboard in her shrink-wrapped outfit, and that, how you say, balanced the fans' passion for the doctor," added Picardo drily of his curvy costar a Bore refusee who like Doc. is star a Bore refusee who like Doc. star, a Borg refugee who, like Doc, is still coming to terms with human emotions.

"I apparently designed that gar-ment that she wears which I imagine took several exhaustive fittings," he

said. going to be you," " he recalled. Barker, he said, went on to make a career for himself playing Thomas



#### Orion Green-Not-So-Peaceful

#### From the Acting Captain's and Ambassador's Logs Stardate 54050.5

At our recent simulation at Starfleet Academy – Pleasant Grove, crewmembers of the U.S.S. Kelly were introduced to an alternate timeline in which there existed a tenuous cease-fire between the Federation, the Romulans, and the Klingons. In this reality, Greenpeace (the nature preservation society) is alive and well. After failing to save the whales of Earth (for a time) they turned their attention to the space lanes, and the subspace damage caused by high warp-speed travel.

In this universe, there is an area known as the "Triangle" bordered by a giant black hole on one side, a dangerous nebula (similar to the "badlands" near Bajor) on another, and Romulan territory on the third. The black hole was constantly sucking matter from the nebula, making the Triangle hazardous to traverse. The point at which the nebula comes closest to the black hole is known as the "Corridor". Being the only ones to have mapped the Corridor thus far, the Orion Syndicate uses it as their staging ground. The Romulans have a planet rich with dilithium on the opposite side of the Corridor from their space, and travel at high warp speeds to avoid attacks by the Orion Syndicate. Greenpeace had blocked the Romulan's path to prevent them from moving through and damaging subspace, as the effect accumulates in narrow areas.

Naturally, this looked like easy pickings to the Syndicate. Our mission was to take the Voyager into the Corridor with our companion ship, the U.S.S. Washington, and either persuade the Romulans to slow down or convince Greenpeace to move out of the way. We were also to distract the Orions from our main taskforce; which was moving in from the opposite side of the nebula.

We received our mission specs at Starbase 12 where we met Ambassador Stephanie Thalmann, who was to join this mission. As we boarded Voyager the crew went first, as is proper, to make sure the ship was in order. Captain Henline came aboard last per Starfleet protocol – however it seemed to take longer than usual.

Once on board, we were introduced to Voyager's Chief Medical Officer and its faithful Chief Engineer, Tex. We also received some specialized training on the Voyager systems, as they're slightly different from the Kelly (only one warp core, etc.).

Captain Henline gave the go ahead to enter the Triangle. It took some doing, but with minimal assistance our pilot got us there in one piece. Just after we arrived in the Triangle and started looking for the Greenpeace vessels, we received a priority-coded communication from Starbase 12. Captain Henline began to act strangely. After asking Crewman Fred Provoncha to scan for the U.S.S. Ticonderoga (on patrol in another sector with the Seventh Fleet), Captain Henline asked the crew to sing "Heading Out to Eden". Both Ambassador Thalmann and Executive Officer Jill Bogler suggested to the Captain that the situation was too dangerous for the crew to be distracted by song. Tex had informed us there was a sophisticated virus in our main computer, and it was wreaking havoc with our systems.

Soon after receiving the priority message, Lt. Commander Bogler received a private ship-to-ship call from the Washington. She was told that "Captain Henline" might be an imposter. (Note: It was at this point that "Captain Henline" asked the crew to sing.) The priority message previously received was a difficult and long one to decode. (The Communications Staff made a valiant effort to decode all incoming messages, and succeeded, requiring only minimal assistance from Lt. Commander George Bogler – the Strategic Operations Officer.) This particular message came from "Captain Quantum" – the real Captain Henline – back on Starbase 12. It ordered XO Bogler to immediately seize "Captain Henline" and assume command, since he was a changeling imposter. Suddenly, Jill was reminded of a past incident when she was "tossed into the

piranha pool" (see Communiqué issue #47). Just after assuming command, Tex informed the new captain that the computer virus had been input using "Captain Henline's" command codes.

The Executive Officer, with the Ambassador's endorsement, ordered Security to arrest "Captain Henline" and instructed the CMO to confirm the changeling's identity. His report stated that, aside from a virus, "Captain Henline" was in perfect health. However, we had reason to doubt this report. Ensign Michael Read, the security guard who kept the Captain restrained, reported that the CMO had left Sick Bay several times while "confirming the identity" of the imposter.

In the midst of this, we were traversing the Corridor in the Triangle to rendezvous with the Greenpeace Flagship, S.S. Treelane. In fact, we were on a collision course with the Treelane, and if it hadn't been for the quick thinking of Lt. Christy Thorsen, the Voyager mission would have ended explosively. The Command Staff was so involved with the arrest of "Captain Henline" that they were unable to issue the stop order.

Lt. Commander Jill Bogler, now acting Captain, issued an order to make contact with the Treelane. We hoped to contact John Talbot, the local Greenpeace leader. Talbot was unavailable, however we spoke with "Dimitri" – a very unusual character. "Dimitri" would only speak with Ambassador Thalmann.

We knew the Romulans would move through the Corridor soon. We also knew the Orion Syndicate was nearby and ready to strike. Ambassador Thalmann's mission orders were to convince Greenpeace to vacate the area (or at least move out of the way). Failing that, we were authorized to transport them aboard Voyager and tractor the Greenpeace vessels out of the Corridor. "Dimitri" did not want to hear it, let alone comply, so we were forced to bring them aboard Voyager.

During "Dimitri's" interrogation, we detected a second transport onto Voyager. Captain Bogler ordered the signal traced. We discovered the beam originated in the nebula, and was relayed through a transport enhancer located on the Treelane. We then targeted the enhancer with our phasers. However, we allowed too much power in the beam and accidentally blew up the Treelane. Voyager would not have been seriously affected, however the computer virus had rendered the ship immobile and susceptible to damage from the blast.

We had been getting reports of physical sabotage (aside from the computer virus), and that "something white" was seen leaving the site of the sabotage. This, combined with the report that a radio signal escaped from Voyager into the nebula, and other suspicious behavior; led us to the conclusion that the CMO was an agent of the Orion Syndicate.

At this point, the Romulan dilithium shipment arrived ahead of schedule. Captain Bogler established contact with the Admiral in charge of the shipment, and let him speak with Ambassador Thalmann. The Ambassador tried to convince the Romulans that high warp movement through the Corridor was causing subspace damage. The Romulan Admiral was not inclined to believe us (nothing seemed to be going our way). They were bearing down on us at warp nine, telling us to move out of their path. This was impossible, as we had no mobility. Ambassador Thalmann convinced the Romulan Admiral that we couldn't move, and asked if they would "please stop". At the last second, the four Romulan vessels complied, and surrounded Voyager at all stop.

As we discussed the situation with the Romulans, forty-one Orion Syndicate ships attacked us. We were in dire straits. The Romulan Admiral believed the attack to be a trap set by Voyager. We confirmed that there were Orion Syndicate agents on board, but assured the Admiral that they were in custody. We also apologized for the signal accidentally sent to the Orions from our bridge.

The Romulans fought valiantly alongside Voyager and the Washington, but progress was slow. The outcome of the confrontation was still very much in doubt. Suddenly the intense amount of traffic in the area began to

take its toll as the inevitable subspace rift formed. The rift destroyed some of the attacking vessels, causing the rest to stop and regroup. Captain Bogler had received a message from the Federation taskforce in the nebula, and had our long-range communications officer, Ensign Don Hallett, send an urgent message requesting their aid.

The Romulan Admiral contacted Voyager and asked some very pointed questions. He stated, "No government in their right mind would send only two ship to defend this area." Captain Bogler agreed, but replied that she "could not say any more on the subject at this time". She did pledge Voyager to the Romulan defense, however.


Unfortunately, during the initial Orion attack, more of Voyager's systems went down and our prisoners escaped. A firefight ensued on the bridge, knocking out our security personnel, the Records officer, and the acting Executive Officer, Lt. Commander George Bogler. Good shot though she is, Captain Bogler didn't have time to fire at the attackers, as they were too quick. However, as she went down, she dropped her phaser within reach of the Ambassador.

It was during the firefight that the regrouped Syndicate ships attacked again. Voyager was really hurting now. After the Captain was stunned, Lt. Thorsen informed the Ambassador that phasers had come back online. Ambassador Thalmann then told her to target the Orions and fire at will. While thus distracted, another attacker stunned the Ambassador. The Executive Officer, regained consciousness, then stunned the attacker and took control of bridge. Captain Bogler revived just in time to see the Washington destroyed by the Orions. The Washington was able to launch escape pods, but due to Voyager's extensive damage she could not assist in the rescue. We have not yet received communication as to their fate.

Voyager was dead in the water, and both Captain Bogler and Ambassador Thalmann thought we were going to be destroyed, when suddenly the cavalry arrived! There was another Federation fleet on maneuvers close by the Corridor. They had received our plea for help and arrived just in time to save the day.

At our debriefing, we discovered that the changeling imposter was named Cadfile and that "Dimitri" was actually Mad Dog, the head of the Orion Syndicate. Mad Dog unfortunately escaped from the Voyager, and put a price on Ambassador Thalmann's head – therefore, she has no desire to enter this alternate reality again.



## GRAND ALLIANCE CLASS FAST DIPLOMATIC TRANSPORT



U.S.S. Grand Alliance NCC-87200

U.S.S. Grand Alliance is designed for short duration diplomatic cruises lasting no more than three months and with the expectation of remaining within Federation boundaries for access to resupply bases. Consumables aboard are stocked with this in mind. All consideration is given to the comfort and safety of diplomatic passengers, with no secondary considerations of exploration or military action.

Crew consists of 300 for ship's operation, plus a security force of 100. Up to 500 passengers may be accommodated with comfort. An additional 1500 may be crammed in for evacuation emergencies. The hangar facilities can garage over 100 large standard shuttles, with palleted stacking and below decks space for dozens of smaller shuttlepods. The formal "landing" pad on the fantail between the nacelle pylons generates a low gravity field to aid landing pilots.

For defense, a standard type X phaser array is fitted for full defensive coverage. No torpedo or probe launching facilities are carried. Standard defensive shielding is fitted. The main deflector dish is recessed behind a blended radome under the saucer. A standard sensor suite is fitted with the exception of planetary survey and star mapping subsets.

Two matter/anti-matter reactors are installed. The starboard core powers the upper pair of warp nacelles, the port core powers the lower pair. In the event of a single core shutdown, the ship can be reconfigured to run on either pair, although some hardware reconfiguration and software changes are necessary. Standard cruising speed is warp 7. Maximum speed of warp 9 can be maintained for up to a week before engine strain. Emergency dash speed of warp 9.9 can be held for 12 hours before automatic shutdown.
